#### SUSTAINABILITY CONTINUED

#### ADJUSTMENTS GARDEN GREEN VIRULYPAD - PARMENTIER ROAD

The municipality of Leiden wants to work towards more variety in public green space. To this end, they have made several plans, also for our neighborhood.

On September 16, the Green Group of the Maredijk shared these plans with the residents of the Parmentierweg and the Virulypad. The goal of these modifications is: more birds, insects and a more varied appearance of the greenery.

As a result of this evening, some minor adjustments were made to the plans. The fundamental starting point remains that there will be enough space for children to play. Secondly, we have indicated that the new planting should not be too high in order to maintain visibility. The work will be carried out this fall and residents will receive a letter from the municipality discussing the plans.



#### IN THE SPOTLIGHT: HUGO AND WIETSE AND DE VETTE GANS

It must have been nearly impossible to miss: the house on the Maredijk that was being build from the ground up. At the end of October, Hugo and Wietse are going to move in there, because that is when they are set to move out of their old house. Hugo is a logistic manager at a construction firm, while Wietse works as a manager in the hospitality industry.

Here's the story of their long journey buying a house, demolishing it and building a new one: Hugo and Wietse renovated their house in the Smidssteeg all by themselves, which they really enjoyed. Due to their desire to start a family and the wish to move into a bigger house, they started looking for a house in dire need of renovation, which took about two years.
"I have always dreamed of building my own home," Wietse says. They searched in a few particular neighbourhoods – with the Maredijkbuurt high

on their list.

Two-and-a-half years ago, the house in question appeared on Funda, and they deemed it to qualify for demolition. They arranged a demolition permit at the same time as they purchased the house. Next, they commissioned an architect. They worked out their own ideas in a 3D-program, although the design had to follow a lot of stipulations posed by the direct environment. The house has little alleys on all sides, as well as other houses at the back. They kept in close contact with the neighbours, and the plans had to be altered thirty times. The city council had a lot of conditions the house had to meet, like the mansard roof (see text box) and a garden. Just before Christmas 2022 the plan was approved. The urban designer, building inspector and environmental protection agency all consented.

The whole process took much longer than anticipated, a total of fourteen months!" Wietse and Hugo had arranged everything with the various experts by themselves. Due to the increasing prices of the materials, everything costed twice as much. That is why they decided to do as much as they could by themselves, except for basic steps such as laying the foundations, masonry and roofing. Their basic principle was: "We can afford to fail two times if we try it ourselves, since the costs of the building material amount to about a third of the costs of hiring constructors to do everything for us." Now they're moving in less than a year after laying the first bricks, so it actually all happened fairly quickly.

As regards sustainability, they started by making a report on future-proofing. They gathered information from a number of institutes, such as the KNMI (Royal Dutch Meteorological Institute), so as to get an overview of the prospects of the next 50 to 100 years (concerning rain/drought, temperature, flooding, biodiversity). According to Hugo, a lot of houses on the Maredijk are crammed next to each other, making it possible that the temperature doesn't drop below 45°C for more than ten days, because the heat can't escape. There is a chance of flooding as well, meaning that they have ensured all household appliances downstairs are flood-proof and that their important belongings are on the first floor or higher up. The rear side of the house has been made fit for bats, there are holes in the brickwork for birds, and the left outer wall will become a green wall, serving to keep the house cool, but beneficial for insects as well. They also got off gas and have placed solar panels on the roof. There is a thermal energy battery in

their house - a new type of boiler that contains salt instead of water. The salt is kept in a vacuum at 70°C, and this is used to heat the water. There's also going to be a battery pack for storing solar energy. From their calculations, they concluded that the number of solar panels on the roof provides enough energy to be fully self-sustaining - even including charging the car. "But we'll have to see in practice whether that works out, Hugo says

When everything is finished, Hugo and Wietse would like to be active members of the community, perhaps in the area of sustainability, but also by participating in activities. But that might still take a while. Their outlook on life? "To live life to the fullest, you need to take up its challenges and sometimes choose to take the road less travelled.

Finally, Hugo and Wietse would like to thank the community for their patience during the demolishment and construction of De Vette Gans (The Fat Goose)!
